## Aim of the course

The aim of the course is to study ethnic relations and conflicts which have always been an important factor in national and international relations. The protractedness of ethnic conflicts, and impossibility of their nonviolent resolution have in last decades caused numerous armed conflicts, disintegration of multi-ethnic states, border changes and demographic migration with serious consequences for the international community. Therefore, ethnic minorities and their status, are attracting increasing attention of academic researchers. Albeit, globally accepted model for regulation (and resolution) of ethnic conflicts is still not present which is why problems related to ethnic minorities are still present worldwide. Therefore, further academic studies are still much needed.

## Outcome of the course

The aim of the course is to improve the understanding of the importance of ethnic relations and resolution of ethnic conflicts in the context of global, regional and national stability. The texts analyzed during the course will be focused on the understanding of ethnic relations and conflicts and on the importance of formulating policy for their prevention (in the context of global security). Special attention will be addressed to issues related to the peaceful resolution of ethnic conflicts.
